

## *A HORSE GRIEVING TO DEATH.*

The Lafayette (Ind.) *Journal* of the 9th inst. says; "Calo Scudder's black horse, the mate to the one that died several months ago, is said to be actually dying from grief at the loss of his associate. The animal has been for some time on pasture at Corey's farm, south of the city. Its appetite seems to be good, though it eats little, and seems to be continually wasting away in flesh. It will have nothing whatever to do with other horses in the pasture, and seems to be continually on the lookout for another. In addition, it every few moments, day and night, whinnies as it used to do when the other horse was alive and the two were separated for a time. Mr. Scudder proposes bringing the horse back to the city in the hope of curing it of what can not be otherwise than a genuine case of heart-break at the loss of a mate."
